

CNSC Innovation Grant Application Package

Important dates

- Grant application launch – August 7, 2026
- Intent to apply deadline – October 16, 2026
- Application submission deadline – November 9, 2026
- Results announcement – week of December 14, 2026
- Funds issued – Instalment 1: December 31, 2026, Instalment 2 before: March 31, 2027

To apply

Applicants must complete the online intent to apply form by 5:00 PM ET on October 16, 2026, with full applications in one (1) PDF due via the application form by 5:00 PM ET on November 9, 2026.

CNSC Innovation Grant

The Canadian Organization of Medical Physicists has an agreement with the Canadian Nuclear Safety Commission to fund one or more Innovation Grants that advance radiation safety within Canadian medical physics practice. Beginning in 2026, the program has been expanded to support larger, higher-impact initiatives through increased funding and the potential for longer project timelines. These changes are intended to encourage collaborative projects that deliver long term benefits to the Canadian medical physics community.

The intent of the program is to support the creation of innovative tools that address radiation safety within medical physics practice. Where relevant to the proposed work, projects may also address radiation source security where this contributes to safe practice and benefits the broader Canadian medical physics and regulated community. Examples may include:

- Software systems to facilitate quality control of safety systems
- Tools to enable consistent and comprehensive equipment service logging
- Tools that enable sharing of quality control and equipment data
- Professional development and educational resources related to radiation safety
- Tools or resources that strengthen radiation source security within medical physics practice

To be eligible for grant funding the primary investigator must be a COMP member in good standing. Applicants must also demonstrate a minimum 25% financial or in-kind contribution from their institution and/or project partners. Matching contributions should be directly related to the proposed project and clearly demonstrated within the

budget. The project must be completed within a three (3) year timeframe (i.e.: December 2029).

Intent to Apply

The intent to apply process has been designed to alert COMP of a member's intent to apply so they can support the member throughout the application process. This is expected to ensure successful grant funding at the end of the timeframe. Note that submission deadlines might be adjusted following the intent to apply deadline and will be communicated to all those who intent to apply.

Application Guide

This guide provides detail on how to prepare your grant application. It includes an overview of the sections that need to be included in your application, how to prepare your package for submission, and provides the referee scoring criteria to help guide you as you prepare the application.

Cover Page

Application Information

The project title and name and academic affiliation of the primary investigator. Please include contact information of the primary investigator: mailing address, telephone number and email.

Body of the Application

Project Information

- Project title
- Financial institution where the funds are to be transferred. Note this is often the same institution as the academic institution of the primary investigator.
- Start and end dates of the project. Note that while project timelines can be established by the project team, projects typically run no longer than 18 months.
- Amount of funds requested. This must not exceed the grant ceiling of \$20,000. If awarded, funds will be disbursed in two instalment payments, one on December 31, 2026, and a second on March 31, 2027.

Participants

The names and academic affiliations for the primary investigator and any co-applicants (note: to be eligible for the grant, the primary investigator must be a COMP member in good standing). Additional participants or staff may be added after the project has been initiated. Detail of new participants and staff should be noted in scheduled progress report to COMP.

Short CVs for the primary investigator and any co-applicants should be included as **Appendix A** of the grant application.

If the project has collaborators (either individuals or organizations) they should be listed, and a letter of collaboration included in **Appendix B** of the grant application.

Project Summary

A brief summary (300 words max) of the project in simple language. It should include:

- Need for the project
- Goal of the project
- Project description
- Future impact or outcomes

Keywords/Technical Terms

Up to 10 specific key words or descriptive technical terms/methodologies that best describe the technical aspects of the project.

Project Proposal

To be examined by the adjudication panel as a key component of the application.

Proposals must include the following sections:

- A detailed overview of the project which clearly describes the problem to be addressed
- The goals and objectives of the proposed project and what strategies will be implemented to enhance its likelihood of success
- Detail on the roles of each participant and whether additional participants will be required to complete the work
- An overview of the methodology that will be used
- The significance of the project to the field of medical physics and the community

Proposals should not exceed 2000 words. Tables and figures can be included and are not considered part of the word limit.

Budget

Grant maximum limits for supplies and expenses (including conference travel), salaries and wages, and permanent equipment combined are \$35,000.

If awarded, funds will be disbursed in two (2) instalments, the first on December 31, 2026, and the second March 31, 2027. Funds may be spent out over the duration of the project, up to a maximum of three (3) years.

Budget should include justification of costs within the following categories:

- Supplies and Expenses which may include materials, services and research and conference travel.
- Salaries and Wages which may include graduate students, research associates, technical and professional assistants. Justification should be provided.
- Equipment may include minor or permanent equipment integral to the proposed project. Computer hardware and software may be included if integral to the project. Justification should be provided.
- In addition to the requested Grant funding, applicants must demonstrate a minimum 25% matching contribution which may include financial or in-kind

support such as personnel salaries, equipment, institutional support or other resources. Applicants should clearly describe the source of each contribution, and how its value has been determined.

Submission Process

Applications must be compiled into a single PDF in the order described in the Application Guide section of this package. Applications submitted that do not conform to this process will not be considered.

Grant applications must be submitted online no later than 5:00pm ET on November 9, 2026.

Adjudication and Scoring

Submitted applications will be adjudicated by an expert review panel that includes at least three (3) COMP members. Applications will be scored against the rubric included in Appendix A.

Reporting requirements

Successful projects will be required to submit three (3) progress reports to COMP in addition to a final report. Reports must summarize progress against project deliverables and budget expenditure including any real or forecasted variances.

Reporting will follow the schedule outlined below:

- By June 30, 2027: A project initiation status report
- By March 31, 2028: A year 1 status report
- By March 31, 2029: A year 2 status report
- By February 28, 2030: A final report

Project participants will also be responsible for submitting an article for InterACTIONS at the conclusion of the project that describes the work and results.
